

Ms. LI Kok-fong


Hello, everyone. I am Ms. Li. I am glad to join the LCU family this year. It is very interesting to meet students with so many different nationalities here.

VALUES Education

Comprehensive and proper sexuality education helps young learners develop positive values, knowledge and skills to make respectful and healthy choices about relationships and sex.

We are implementing a series of sex education programmes from P.1 to P.6 students in Values Education Lessons this year. Our main focus is on developing proper attitudes towards sex and providing information and instructions on ways for protecting oneself from sexual abuse. To make these learning programmes an interesting learning experience for students, we make use of a variety of multimedia equipments, animations and games, so as to provide students with a process of self-actualization and individual's mental, physical, social, emotional and spiritual growth.







We deliver sexual abuse preventive messages to P.1 - P.3 students through puppet shows and interactive games.



We also provide sex education programmes to P.4 - P.6 students to raise their awareness on the need for protecting one's own body and respecting that of others.







Values Education is an essential element of whole-person education which aims to foster students' positive values and attitudes through the learning and teaching of various Key Learning Areas/Subjects, the provision of relevant learning experiences and our school-based Values Education (VE).

We promote Values Education by nurturing our students in the twelve priority values and attitudes: "Perseverance", "Respect for Others", "Responsibility", "National Identity", "Commitment", "Integrity", "Care

for Others", "Law-abidingness", "Empathy" and "Diligence", "Empathy" and "Self-discipline".

We aim to develop students' ability to identify these values, analyze different issues objectively and make reasonable judgements when they encounter them at different developmental stages. This will help them take proper action when facing challenges in their future life.



Taking cultivation of positive values and attitudes as the direction, we make use of everyday life events to strengthen the coordination of learning activities.

Programme &



Our school has joined the CoolThink@JC Programme, which is co-organized by the Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust, the Education University of Hong Kong, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and City University of Hong Kong. The programme aims to inspire students in P.4-6 to embrace digital creativity in their daily lives. It provides a 3-year curriculum for these students to learn Scratch and App Inventor programming during their IT lessons.

Going beyond the confines of the classroom, a CoolThink@JC Parent Workshop was conducted in February 2023, offering parents an opportunity to learn Scratch programming alongside their children. In June 2023, thirty students from P.4-5 were selected to participate in a half-day camp held at the Education University of Hong Kong, aimed at building a stronger foundation in programming. Additionally, our school actively took part in an open exhibition at The Education University of Hong Kong in June 2023, where we set up booth games with STEAM elements to engage the public.





The purpose of extracurricular activity groups is to provide students with opportunities to engage in activities outside of their regular academic curriculum. They allow them to focus on specific interests or hobbies with classes led by teachers and coaches.

Creative Art and Graft Group

Students learn a variety of skills and concepts related to artistic expression and craftsmanship. They explore different art forms and engage



in hands-on activities involving various craft techniques. Students are encouraged to develop their creative thinking and imagination.



Putonghue Chorel Speeking Croup



It is a form of performance art in which 42 students recite a poem in unison, emphasizing rhythm, intonation, and coordination. Students develop their speaking, listening, and team spirit, as well as gain an appreciation for literature and language. Additionally, young learners in P.1 to P.3 learn to speak, understand and read for fun in Putonghua.

STEAM and Microsiff Learning Group



It focuses on providing children with knowledge and skills in critical thinking and problem-solving, inquiry and investigation as well as creativity and innovation.

Students are trained to use coding to solve problems.



Cheering Dance Group

It combines elements of dance, gymnastics, and cheerleading to create energetic and synchronized performances.





Chinese Drum Group

It offers students a range of valuable skills and experiences including rhythm and timing. Students learn to develop a strong sense of timing, precision, and coordination. They become familiar with different beats, tempos, and patterns. They also gain an appreciation for Chinese traditions, music, and cultural practices as well as learn about the historical significance and symbolism of drums in Chinese culture.

Adive Brain Workshop

It focuses on providing students with activities and exercises that stimulate their cognitive, physical, and social development. They learn to identify and manage their emotions, develop self-awareness, and understand the feelings of others. The workshop encourages empathy,



self-regulation, and building positive relationships.



Juggling and Magic Group

Students focus on the skills and techniques involved in stage magic and entertainment. Students develop sleight of hand and performance skills. Some individuals may pursue magic as a hobby.





Sodial Skills Group


Students can develop various social skills including communication skills, collaboration and teamwork, empathy and understanding, as well as conflict resolution. They learn to express their thoughts and ideas clearly, actively listen to others, ask questions by engaging in meaningful games.



Fun in Putonghua

The P.1 to P.3 students take turns to attend the Putonghua workshop on Friday ECA lessons. They can develop their language foundation read and pronounce Putonghua accurately by using the

Pinyin system. Through this Putonghua activities, students develop overall proficiency in Mandarin Chinese, they also learn to appreciate and understand Chinese culture.











This is our first time to recruit young players from P.3 to P.4 to form the junior cricket team. Students learn the fundamental skills and techniques of cricket in a simplified and age-appropriate manner. They learnt the basic rules, as well as batting, bowling and fielding skills. Additionally students found out about game awareness, fitness, sportsmanship and fair play which will help them step up to senior cricket in the future.

Boryeong Mud Festival, South Korea

This muddy festival is celebrated for almost 2 weeks in July in the small town of Boryeong on the west coast of South Korea. Every year around 2 million people come to the town to get drenched in mud, and people take part in a lot of different muddy activities like mudslides, mud pools, and even mud skiing. The mud is supposed to have a lot of natural minerals that are good for the skin. Just make sure to have a good shower afterwards! Find out more here:

This unusual festival is celebrated in the town of Whitehorse in Northern Canada in February. You wouldn't want to step outside there in the middle of winter without your hat and scarf. In fact, it can get so cold (sometimes as low as -20oC) that your hair freezes if it is wet. That's why they have an entire festival dedicated to frozen hair sculptures. People soak their head in the freezing cold water and then sculpt their hair into super cool styles hoping to take home the \$2000 prize. Check out the winners from last year:



Underwater Music Festival, Florida, USA

Hundreds of snorkelers and divers gather off the coast of Florida every July to play ocean-themed songs at the Underwater Music Festival. For almost 40 years, music has been streamed from specially-designed underwater speakers with the aim of creating awareness about the preservation of the coral reefs. Lopburi Monkey Banquet, Thailand

Every year in Lopburi in Northern Thailand, they have the annual Monkey Buffet Festival. The festival has been going for 35 years and was first set up as a unique way of showing gratitude to the monkeys as well as bring in tourism. The monkeys are thought to bring good luck to the area and its people and so in return they are given thousands of kilograms of fruit, vegetables, cakes and candies. Baby Jumping Festival, Spain

For more than 400 years, people have been coming to the town of Sasamón in Northern Spain to take part in a very strange festival called Baby Jumping (or El Salto del Colacho in Spanish). Men dressed in red and yellow devil costumes jump over babies lying on mattresses in the street. This is supposed to bring the babies good fortune and protect them from evil spirits. Battle of the Oranges, Italy

Every year in February, thousands of people come to the small Italian town of Ivrea to have a huge food fight. It's not only one of the juiciest festivals in the world (600 tonnes of oranges are used each year!) but also one of the oldest - people have been throwing citrus fruit here for more than 200 years!!! Argungu Fishing Festival, Nigeria

The annual fishing festival is held every year in Northern Nigeria to mark the start of the fishing season. The highlight of this four-day festival happens on the last day when as many as 50,000 fishermen take part in the ultimate fishing competition. The rules are simple, whoever catches the largest fish in the 1-hour time limit is the winner, and can take home as much as 7,500 US dollars. Learn more about this fishy festival here:
